BOOK OVERVIEW

An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi records the complex history from early contact between Māori and Pākehā through to the Treaty settlement processes of the twenty-first century.

- the text is accessible to senior secondary students
- chronological chapters
- illustrated throughout with photographs, paintings, maps and texts
- tables include Treaty Settlements to 31 March 2004 and diagrams describe the Treaty settlement process
- appendices contain texts of the Treaty of Waitangi, Treaty signatories, Iwi locations, Māori land 1860–1939, Waitangi Tribunal timeline
- concludes with a note on text, illustration and sources; bibliography and index.

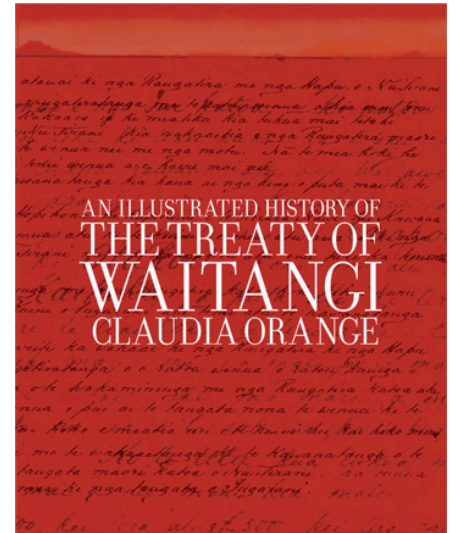

USING AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY OF THE TREATY OF WAITANGI IN YOUR HISTORY PROGRAMME

2.1/3.1 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* can be used:

- as a source of primary and secondary material for inquiry into the Treaty of Waitangi
- for research – nineteenth and twentieth century New Zealand
- to investigate cultural contact or race relations in New Zealand.

2.2/3.2 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* and other sources can be used to produce:

- a researched essay on the Treaty of Waitangi
- a 'Waitangi Calendar' of the history of the Treaty with illustrations and supporting text
- a magazine article on the work of the Waitangi Tribunal
- a guide for the Waitangi National Trust for visitors to the Treaty grounds
- a poster (illustrations and supporting text) about the Treaty.

2.4 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* and other sources can be used to:

- design a webpage or series of letters to the editor or blog showing at least two different perspectives of the Treaty (at the time of the signing or subsequent to the signing).

2.6 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* and other sources can be used to:

- create an essay on the impact of the Treaty on New Zealand history

3.4 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* and other sources can be used to:

- produce an analysis of a contested event, examining different perspectives and the reasons for them. Events could include the Foreshore and Seabed legislation or the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi
- write the script for a radio debate on the importance of the Treaty showing differing perspectives.

2.5/3.5 *An Illustrated History of the Treaty of Waitangi* and other sources can be used to:

- write an essay that examines or analyses the reasons for the signing of the Treaty and the consequences of that signing.

INDEPENDENT ENQUIRY

- This book would also be useful for social studies (especially senior social studies, levels 1–3).
- Use the book to create an illustrated timeline on a classroom wall of New Zealand history since 1769.
